#### A LETTER FROM THE MCHS BOARD

Imagine, if you will, a downtown Millbrook that is devoid of the beautiful Victorian era storefronts and buildings.

Strolling along King Street, you can admire the work recently done to the Millbrook Dental Office, once the TD Canada Trust at the corner of Tupper. As you continue along, you see the Whale Family Chiropractic office, which still has the bank vault door intact, you can see it if you've ever wandered inside. Then onto the charming windows of the Pastry Peddler (here is a fun fact: the Historical Society used to call that storefront its own!). And then to the Joneses. Across the street, you have the beautiful, colorful storefronts that make up the small businesses of friends and neighbours.

We think back fondly of Christmas in the Village, hosted by the BIA and its volunteers. The wonderful, seasonal decorations and planters that line our quaint downtown streets. Millbrook is so idyllic, when people take photos to send to far off friends they often comment that it looks like a movie set. In fact, it has been a movie set—bringing in much needed revenue and exposure to our little neck of the woods.

Now, imagine, if you will, a downtown Millbrook that is devoid of the architecture that is so charming. Imagine that someone who owned one of these buildings could, without consultation, bulldoze these time capsules to the ground and construct a parking lot, impacting the entire atmosphere and character of the downtown area.

Or could let their building go into such a state of disrepair that it was demolition by neglect.

We've seen towns where the designation has been a successful way to preserve the cultural heritage buildings that provide residents and visitors with a glimpse into the past. Niagaraon-the-Lake has a booming tourism industry, in part because of their preservation efforts and the way the area has attracted various types of industries that encourage visitors. Queen and Picton streets are heritage conservation districts. I can't help but think of our local farm community and Rolling Grape vineyard when I draw the comparison and think of the potential of our township as a destination for a day trip or a stop on the way to Ottawa or cottage country. I consider Unionville and downtown Oakville, Byward Market in Ottawa, and Walton, John, Ontario, and Queen Streets in Port Hope to be excellent examples of well preserved heritage conservation areas that add to quality of life for residents and draw visitors from near and far.

In researching the requirements, we thought it would be helpful to hear from small business owners and residents who live and work in places that have a designated heritage district. We spoke with the owners of The Men's Room, a popular barbershop on Walton Street in downtown Port Hope. "We come into [cont'd]

work and some mornings just feel lucky to work in such a beautiful downtown," Katie Haalstra, coowner of The Men's Room, shared with us. "There is just a special sense of community when there's
pride shown in the upkeep of a heritage district." Katie and her sister Laura opened The Men's
Room in 2019 and it has been booming ever since. "In the summer in particular, you can see so
many people coming from out-of-town to spend a day in the historical downtown. By staying true
to the heritage of the town, Port Hope is set apart from other towns and has become a tourist
destination." We asked the sisters if they felt the heritage designations had helped their business,
and Laura chimed in, "This helps bring so much business to the local shops. We have had new
clients say they started off just visiting Port Hope and they fell in love with its charm and decided
to make the move."

Let's work together, as a community, to protect what remains of our unique heritage downtown. Our Annual General Meeting, which will be held in May (more details to come), will include a special guest that will elaborate on this fascinating and timely topic--we hope you will join us.



#### MCHS HAS A NEW COMMUNITY PARTNER

We have been invited to move in with a long-time friend and it's time! CM Libraries and the Historical Society are a great match.

Over the past few years, your Historical Society has worked with the Millbrook branch of Cavan Monaghan Libraries in a number of ways. The library is the location of our heritage display cabinet where Board member Peter Ramsay curates exhibits featuring both local artifacts and heritage collections, and the library offers access to Ancestry Library Edition for genealogy research. In the past we have held a number of events in the Harry Williams Room and have collaborated on a Remembrance Day Movie Night. Library staff also receive inquiries from patrons about local heritage features and programming and pass them along to us.

So, it just makes sense to deepen our relationship with such a compatible friend and ally. The move will make accessing the collection and responding to inquiries easier and more efficient. # SEASONED AUTHOR ADDS PLAYWRITING TO EXCEPTIONAL RESUME

D'Arcy Jenish has stepped into new territory with his first play, The Tilco Strike, which will be premiered this July at 4 th Line Theatre.


D'Arcy Jenish's career as a writer and journalist started with small-town newspapers in southwestern Ontario. Originally from Saskatchewan, he attended high school in Peterborough and graduated from the University of Western Ontario. The West called him back in 1979 for a seven year stint with Alberta Report in Edmonton. As Senior Editor he covered business, politics and sports at a time of political upheaval, particularly between Ottawa and the province over the National Energy Policy, and in 1985 he became Alberta Report's first Ottawa Bureau Chief, to cover national affairs from a regional perspective.

He caught the attention of Maclean's in a very short time and joined Canada's National Newsmagazine in 1986 as Senior Writer. His assignments took him across Canada and the United States to interview and write about leading personalities in the worlds of sport,

business, the arts and sciences, but while he was covering royal tours, federal elections and major trials, he was also looking out for the local or regional story that would touch readers across the country.

Jenish left Maclean's in 2001 to build a freelance writing business that has thrived. Along with newspaper and magazine features and commentaries, corporate reports and speeches, he has also written seven works of historical non-fiction, ranging in subject matter from the mapping of Canada's West by David Thompson, the fall of the Plains Cree and the Blackfoot Confederacy, the FLQ Crisis, and hockey – clearly a passion as the sport is the focus of no fewer that three of his books.

And now, D'Arcy Jenish has stepped into new territory with his first play, The Tilco Strike, which will be premiered this July at 4 th Line Theatre. The play tells the story of the year-long fight in 1965 by 35 poorly paid women at Tilco Plastics in Peterborough over a \$25 bonus denied them by management. The strike escalated into an epic battle between organized labour and strike-breaking employers, and changed labour relations in Ontario forever. There may be some here in our area who remember Tilco Plastics or were even employed there. Get in touch with us, please! 
# DEAR MCHS... CAN YOU HELP SOLVE A HISTORY MYSTERY?

Elaine and Peter Leigh are new to Cavan and have some questions about their new homestead, 120 Hwy 7A, and its past residents.

Kim, our wonderful research and geneaology volunteer, has managed to find out that the property was originally a clergy reserve, land set aside for the church when the township was initially surveyed. Typically lot 2 on every second concession was a clergy reserve. There is also a sawmill noted as being on the creek on the property. The ownership history from 1835 to 1996 was a good source of information. The lots were initially surveyed as 200 acre parcels. There was a sale to Cuthbert Richardson of the 100 acres in the south half of the lot in 1844. In 1867 you can see the parcel being split into 2 fifty acre parcels.

Kim found it interesting that the location of the sawmill was not included on the map of mills that was included in This Green and Pleasant Land, the book is generally well researched but it may be that there was no one left around to tell the story of that particular mill when the book was published in 1990.
