On Friday, April 11, we look forward to welcoming members of the Board organizing the Bicentennial of the Peter Robinson Emigration Project that brought over 2,000 Irish men, women and children on nine ships to "the place at the end of the rapids" which the local First Nations called Nogojiwanong. We now know it as Peterborough.

To mark this Bicentennial, the not-for-profit organization called **Nine Ships 1825 Inc.** has been formed to honour this chapter in Canadian history. Members of the Board will talk about the significance of this emigration, describe the journey, and highlight coming events planned for this summer. Remembering our Heritage Champion Peter Ramsay

Peter Ramsay made his mark here in so many ways. Known for his passion for our local built heritage, as manifested in the pictorial book Significant Architecture of Millbrook which he edited, he fiercely championed heritage designation as a way to safeguard the integrity of our local architectural legacy.

Peter delighted in the excellence of fine craftsmanship. His eyes lit up at the prospect of a winning bid on a finely wrought tool that he could add to his collection. His eyes also lit up as he greeted you at the door, or on a walk in the village, or on the Millbrook Valley Trails.



Peter and his wife Anne arrived in Millbrook in 2001. Originally both from Toronto, Peter moved his family to Peterborough in 1975, and established his own graphic design studio. His skill in applied art, innovation and creativity took him well beyond his successful business, out of the office and into the garden where his artistry extended to the landscape. Here he worked contours and colours into a living tapestry that was further enhanced by examples of his other inspired pastime as a stain glass artist. Whimsical corners of his garden featured intriguing doorways and panels of beautiful stain glass. Some of Peter's creations can also be found in a number of heritage homes in Millbrook and the surrounding area.



Peter loved this community and was an active member and sometime leader of the area Garden Club, the Municipal Revitalization and Heritage Advisory Committee, and our own Historical Society. He was also a devoted dog-lover, and enjoyed the walks and companionship that he shared with his Golden Retrievers, Sophie and Emma.

Most precious of all to Peter was his family; his wife and life partner Anne whom he adored, and his beloved daughters Cris and Jenny who were by his side at all times in his last weeks with us. We will all miss him.

Through a series of questions, Rob drew out from George detailed memories of his early years at Needler's Mill and growing up in the village, training for service as a volunteer firefighter and training officer, and his years at Millbrook's LCBO outlet.
